Who:	Per OSEP guidance, "personnel providing ESY services should meet the same requirements that apply to personnel providing the services that are part of a regular school program."	Since compensatory educational services are not outlined in the IDEA, there is no guidance on personnel responsible to provide compensatory educational services. An offer of compensatory educational services may include the intended service provider, but there is no requirement that the service provider be the same as outlined in the student's IEP.
Procedural Safeguards:	Parents retain their right to exercise the options outlined in the procedural safeguards if they disagree with an ESY determination.	Parents retain their rights to utilize options outlined in the procedural safeguards to resolve a dispute as to the provision of a FAPE if they reject the PEA's offer of compensatory services.
