	Are the grassy areas and lawns mowed?
	Is the leaf litter, brush and weeds at the edge of the lawn removed?
	Is the brush and leaf litter around stone walls, wood piles and foundations removed?
	Are there unsealed gaps in and under stone walls, foundations, sheds, or under stacks of stored materials that can harbor rodents? (If checked, this should be remedied)
	Are the tree branches and shrubs around the lawn edge trimmed?
	Is there a 3 foot or wider border of wood chips, mulch, or gravel between lawn and woods?
	Are the shrubs, trees and flower beds maintained and pruned to discourage rodents and reduce shade?
	Are the wooded trails wide and vegetation is opened up at trail edges to reduce shade?
	Are the swings and equipment away from wooded areas and on mulch or wood chip foundation?
	Are the birdfeeders away from play areas?
	Is there deer fencing in place to keep deer off the playground?

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Action	ns that can be taken:
	Install a 3-foot or wider wood chip, mulch, or gravel border between lawn and woods.
	Maintain and prune shrubs, trees and flower beds.
	Widen and clean up woodland trails.
	Move swing sets and sand boxes away from the woodland edge and place them on a wood chip or mulch foundation.
	Eliminate rodent habitat by sealing gaps in and under stone walls, foundations, and sheds and by removing stacks of stored materials
	Use of deer fencing to keep deer away from playground.
	Keep bird feeders away from the play areas and clean up spilled bird food.
