Re: NOTICE OF DATA BREACH

Dear << Estate of>> << First Name>> << Last Name>>,

We are writing to let you know of a data security breach involving Ohio History Connection's (OHC) computer systems and databases. Because this breach has possibly exposed personally identifiable information, we wanted to inform you as soon as possible of steps to protect your identity.

What happened?

In early July, cybercriminals executed a ransomware attack upon internal data servers at OHC, effectively encrypting and holding our data hostage. The group also demanded that OHC pay a ransom in the millions of dollars in order to avoid the release of the data to the public. OHC was unable to afford the demanded amount but made an offer to the cybercriminals to prevent the release of the data. On August 7, the cybercriminals rejected the offer. Your personal information may now be accessible to those who may be looking for it.

How did this happen?

In most cases, ransomware is spread through phishing emails that contain malicious attachments or through a user unknowingly visiting an infected website, automatically downloading and installing malware without the user's knowledge.

What information was involved and who was impacted?

Names, addresses, and Social Security numbers of current and former OHC employees (from 2009 to 2023) could have been accessed. No credit card information was accessed or stolen as part of this breach. However, cybercriminals may have gained access to W-9 reports and other records revealing the names and personal Social Security numbers of vendors who contracted to provide services to OHC. They also may have gained access to images of checks provided to OHC by some members and donors beginning in 2020. In total, the information of 7,600 individuals has potentially been exposed.

What we are doing to prevent this from happening again?

OHC has notified the FBI and retained forensic IT consulting firms to assist in determining the extent of the data breach, reconstructing its systems and restoring data. OHC also employed a consultant that specializes in communicating with groups who engage in cybercriminal activity to determine the amount the group was demanding and assess the extent of the data actually accessed, encrypted and released.

In restoring its data and systems, OHC has moved a vast majority of its data to cloud-based services, and has implemented new security systems, features and measures intended to reduce its vulnerability to future attacks and ensure no personally identifiable information is ever accessed again.

What you can do?

OHC is providing **free credit monitoring services for << one year/two years>> for anyone involved. Sign up at <u>https://response.idx.us/ohc.</u> OHC has also notified all three national credit reporting agencies. Any questions can be directed to 1-888-566-6462. Please note the deadline for enrollment is November 23, 2023.**

Beyond signing up, we also recommend that you remain vigilant and promptly report any suspicious activity or suspected identity theft to IDX at https://response.idx.us/ohc or 1-888-566-6462. Such activity should also be reported to the proper law enforcement authorities, your credit card providers, and your financial institutions.

Please also be wary of solicitations from those who may call you and offer their services. Do not give your personal information to anyone who requests it (online or over the phone) under the guise of helping you protect your personal information.

You can have the credit reporting agencies place a hold on the provision of your credit information, and can obtain from them a report on your credit. You are entitled to receive one free credit report from each of the three national credit reporting agencies once per year.
