The investigation into this matter is ongoing, and this notice will be supplemented with any new significant facts learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Brorson does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maine law, the applicability of the Maine data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On or around April 5, 2022, Brorson learned that an unknown individual accessed certain areas of its network from September 10, 2021 to November 11, 2021. Brorson undertook a forensic investigation with the assistance of third-party forensic specialists and reviewed these areas for personal information. Brorson completed the review on or around June 3, 2022 and identified information including name and Social Security number.

Notice to Maine Resident

On or about June 16, 2022, Brorson began providing written notice of this incident to one (1) Maine resident. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, Brorson moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of Brorson systems, and identify the potentially affected individual and business partners. Further, Brorson notified the Internal Revenue Service and federal law enforcement regarding the event. Brorson is providing access to credit monitoring services for twelve (12) months through Experian, to the notified individual, at no cost to this individual.

Additionally, Brorson is providing the individual with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud. Brorson is providing the individual with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, information on protecting against tax fraud, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

Brorson is providing written notice of this incident to relevant business partners and state regulators, as necessary, and to the three major credit reporting agencies, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion.

Brorson & Associates ("Brorson") is writing to inform you that we identified and addressed a security incident that involved some of your information. We take this incident seriously and write to provide you with information about the incident, what we are doing in response, and the resources that are available to you to help better protect your personal information from possible misuse, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

 - Review your account to determine if a 2021 return has already been filed. If so, you are likely a victim of identity theft and your return will need to be paper filed.
 - At www.IRS.gov, search "Get an IP Pin." Log into your account and choose a PIN. Print the page for your records. Each tax filing season you will need to log into the account to get the PIN for that filing season. You cannot file your return without the PIN.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order your free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. You may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of your credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended "fraud alert" on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer's credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer's credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer's identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should you wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any one of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a "credit freeze" on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer's express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving

the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To request a security freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

- 1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
- 2. Social Security number;
- 3. Date of birth;
- 4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
- 5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
- 6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, etc.); and
- 7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.
