Re: Notice of Data Incident

Dear Dalton McDermott,

This letter is to notify you that we recently discovered that a data security incident may have resulted in the possible unintentional exposure of your personal information.

This letter contains additional information about the incident, our response to this incident, and steps you can take to protect yourself. Please rest assured that the Noll Law Office takes the protection and proper use of your personal information very seriously. Law enforcement has been notified and we sincerely apologize for any inconvenience this may cause.

What Happened

On April 1, 2022, the Noll Law Office detected suspicious activity within its network environment. Upon discovery, the information technology (IT) support team was notified. We immediately engaged a law firm specializing in cybersecurity and data privacy to investigate. Additionally, the Noll Law Office retained a third-party forensic specialists to assist the Noll Law Office in its analysis of any unauthorized activity. The forensic investigation concluded on April 26, 2022. While the potentially impacted information varies by individual, the investigation concluded that certain personal information – including names, driver's license numbers, medical records, and in some instances social security numbers – were accessed by an unknown party that is not authorized to handle or view such information.

At this time, the Noll Law Office cannot verify whether any of your personal information has been or will be misused as a result of this incident. The Noll Law Office is notifying you of this incident out of an abundance of caution.

What We Are Doing

Although we are not aware of any misuse of your information as a result of this incident, we are offering you Single Bureau Credit Monitoring* services at no charge provided by Cyberscout, a company specializing in fraud assistance and remediation services. This is because we take the protection and proper use of personal information extremely seriously. As part of our ongoing

commitment to information privacy and the security of information, we are notifying you of this incident.

Cyberscout's services include: access to Single Bureau Credit Monitoring* services at no charge. These services provide you with alerts for twelve months from the date of enrollment when changes occur to your credit file. This notification is sent to you the same day that the change or update takes place with the bureau. In addition, we are providing you with proactive fraud assistance to help with any questions that you might have or in the event you become a victim of identity theft..

To enroll in Credit Monitoring* services at no charge, please log on to **https://www.myidmanager.com** and follow the instructions provided. When prompted please provide the following unique code to receive services: **I47ahu6rotxr** In order for you to receive the monitoring services described above, you must enroll within 90 days from the date of this letter.

The enrollment requires an internet connection and e-mail account and may not be available to minors under the age of 18 years of age. Please note that when signing up for monitoring services, you may be asked to verify personal information for your own protection to confirm your identity.

We encourage you to contact Cyberscout with any questions by calling 1-800-405-6108 from 8:00 am to 8:00 pm, Monday through Friday, excluding holidays. Representatives are available for 90 days.

What You Can Do:

Further, as a best practice, we encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud, to review your financial account statements, and to monitor your credit reports for suspicious activity. This letter also includes additional information and resources to assist you in protecting your personal information, should you feel it appropriate to do so.

Additional Information

Credit Reports: You may obtain a copy of your credit report, free of charge, whether or not you suspect any unauthorized activity on your account. You may obtain a free copy of your credit report from each of the three nationwide credit reporting agencies. To order your free credit report, please visit www.annualcreditreport.com, or call toll-free at 1-877-322-8228. You can also order your annual free credit report by mailing а completed Annual Credit Report Request Form (available at https://www.consumer.ftc.gov/articles/0155-free-credit-reports) to: Annual Credit Report Request Service, P.O. Box 105281, Atlanta, GA, 30348-5281.

Security Freeze: You also have the right to place a security freeze on your credit report. A security freeze is intended to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. To place a security freeze on your credit report, you need to make a request to each consumer reporting agency. You may make that request by certified mail, overnight mail, regular stamped mail, or by following the instructions found at the websites listed below. The following information must be included when requesting a security freeze (note that if you are requesting a credit report for your spouse or a minor under the age of 16, this information must be provided for him/her as well): (1) full name, with middle initial and any suffixes; (2) Social Security number; (3) date of birth; (4) current address and any previous addresses for the past five years; and (5) any applicable incident report or complaint with a law enforcement agency or the Registry of Motor Vehicles. The request must also include a copy of a government-issued identification card and a copy of a recent utility bill or bank or insurance statement. It is essential that each copy be legible, display your name and current mailing address, and the date of issue. As of September 21, 2018, it is free to place, lift, or remove a security freeze. You may also place a security freeze for children under the age of 16. You may obtain a free security freeze by contacting any one or more of the following national consumer reporting agencies:

Fraud Alerts: You can place fraud alerts with the three credit bureaus by phone and online with:

- Equifax (<u>https://assets.equifax.com/assets/personal/Fraud_Alert_Request_Form.pdf</u>);
- TransUnion (<u>https://www.transunion.com/fraud-alerts</u>); or
- Experian (<u>https://www.experian.com/fraud/center.html</u>).

A fraud alert tells creditors to follow certain procedures, including contacting you, before they open any new accounts or change your existing accounts. For that reason, placing a fraud alert can protect you, but also may delay you when you seek to obtain credit. As of September 21, 2018, initial fraud alerts last for one year. Victims of identity theft can also get an extended fraud alert for seven years. The phone numbers for all three credit bureaus are at the bottom of this page.

Monitoring: You should always remain vigilant and monitor your accounts for suspicious or unusual activity.

File Police Report: You have the right to file or obtain a police report if you experience identity fraud. Please note that in order to file a crime report or incident report with law enforcement for identity theft, you will likely need to provide proof that you have been a victim. A police report is often required to dispute fraudulent items. You can generally report suspected incidents of identity theft to local law enforcement or to the Attorney General.

FTC and Attorneys General: You can further educate yourself regarding identity theft, fraud alerts, security freezes, and the steps you can take to protect yourself, by contacting the consumer reporting agencies, the Federal Trade Commission, or your state Attorney General.
