

MAINE APPENDIX

ebm-papst, Inc. (“ebm-papst”) recently concluded its investigation of an incident that involved unauthorized access to certain files on its computer systems. Upon identifying the incident, ebm-papst took steps to secure the systems involved, commenced an investigation, and engaged a cybersecurity firm to assist. In connection with that investigation, ebm-papst discovered that an unauthorized party accessed and/or acquired certain files from its systems between February 3, 2022 and February 5, 2022. ebm-papst reviewed the files that may have been involved. On March 4, 2022, ebm-papst determined that one or more of those files contained personal information of two (2) Maine residents, including their names and one or more of the following: Social Security number and/or driver's license number.

On April 6, 2022, ebm-papst is providing written notice via United States Postal Service First Class Mail to the Maine residents whose personal information was potentially accessed by an unauthorized party, in accordance with ME. Rev. Stat. Tit. 10§1348.¹ ebm-papst is offering individuals whose Social Security number and/or driver's license number may have been affected, a complimentary, two-year membership to credit monitoring and identity theft prevention services through Experian, which includes credit monitoring, fraud consultation, and identity theft restoration. ebm-papst is also encouraging the affected individuals to remain vigilant by reviewing their accounts for unauthorized activity.

To help prevent a similar incident from occurring in the future, ebm-papst has implemented additional security measures to enhance the security of its network and enhanced employee training concerning data security.
