Bristol Bay Construction Holdings ("BBCH") recently learned of a scam that involved a website created to imitate Ceridian, the human resource portal utilized by BBCH. The fake website was designed to be accessible via a search engine (such as Google and Bing) and collect account credentials when individuals attempted to log into the fake portal. Recently, a BBCH user, believing they were accessing the legitimate Ceridian portal, unknowingly accessed the fake website and provided their username and password to the bad actor. BBCH became aware of this incident when the internal protocols identified a request submitted to BBCH payroll that was not consistent with BBCH procedures. After a brief inquiry, BBCH independently engaged cybersecurity professionals to conduct an investigation and verify that their own systems are secure. On January 9, 2024, logging provided by Ceridian confirmed that the bad actor downloaded an employee census report that contained the names and Social Security numbers of 27 Maine residents.

On April 9, 2024, BBCH mailed notification letters to the Maine residents via U.S. mail in accordance with Me. Rev. Stat. Tit. 10, §1348. A copy of the notification letter is enclosed. BBCH is offering notified individuals complimentary one-year memberships to credit monitoring and identity protection services.

To help prevent this type of incident from happening again, BBCH implemented additional security measures and will continue to train employees concerning data security.

Bristol Bay Construction Holdings ("BBCH") recognizes the importance of protecting employee information. We are writing to inform you of an incident that may have involved some of your information. This notice explains the incident, the measures we have taken in response, and some additional steps you may consider taking.

What happened? BBCH recently learned of a scam that involved a website created to imitate Ceridian, the human resource portal utilized by BBCH. The fake website was designed to be accessible via a search engine (such as Google and Bing) and collect account credentials when individuals attempted to log into the fake portal. Recently, a BBCH user, believing they were accessing the legitimate Ceridian portal, unknowingly accessed the fake website and provided their username and password to the bad actor. We became aware of this incident when our internal protocols identified a request submitted to BBCH payroll that was not consistent with BBCH procedures. After a brief inquiry, we independently engaged cybersecurity professionals to conduct an investigation and verify that our own systems are secure.

What information was involved? Logging provided by Ceridian showed that the bad actor downloaded an employee census report that contained your name and Social Security number between November 6, 2023, and November 7, 2023.

What we are doing in response: We take matters like this very seriously. In addition to conducting our own investigation, we addressed the scam website issue with Ceridian and ensured that additional security controls are implemented on our platform to help prevent a future incident. We also want to remind you that BBCH offers all employees credit monitoring and identity theft protection at no cost through LifeLock. This plan includes identity monitoring and alerts, full-service remediation, and identity theft reimbursement. We remind you it is always advisable to be vigilant for incidents of fraud or identity theft by reviewing your account statements and free credit reports for any unauthorized activity over the next 12 to 24 months. You may obtain a copy of your credit report, free of charge, once every 12 months from each of the three nationwide credit reporting companies. To order your annual free credit report, please visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call toll free at 1-877-322-8228. If you believe you are the victim of identity theft or have reason to believe your personal information has been misused, you should immediately contact the Federal Trade Commission and/or the Attorney General's office in your state. You should also contact your local law enforcement authorities and file a police report. Fraud Alerts and Security Freezes

Fraud Alerts: There are two types of general fraud alerts you can place on your credit report to put your creditors on notice that you may be a victim of fraud—an initial alert and an extended alert. You may ask that an initial fraud alert be placed on your credit report if you suspect you have been, or are about to be, a victim of identity theft. An initial fraud alert stays on your credit report for one year. You may have an extended alert placed on your credit report if you have already been a victim of identity theft with the appropriate documentary proof. An extended fraud alert stays on your credit report for seven years.

To place a fraud alert on your credit reports, contact one of the nationwide credit bureaus. A fraud alert is free. The credit bureau you contact must tell the other two, and all three will place an alert on their versions of your report.

For those in the military who want to protect their credit while deployed, an Active Duty Military Fraud Alert lasts for one year and can be renewed for the length of your deployment. The credit bureaus will also take you off their marketing lists for pre-screened credit card offers for two years, unless you ask them not to.

Credit or Security Freezes: You have the right to put a credit freeze, also known as a security freeze, on your credit file, free of charge, which makes it more difficult for identity thieves to open new accounts in your name. That's because most creditors need to see your credit report before they approve a new account. If they can't see your report, they may not extend the credit.

How do I place a freeze on my credit reports? There is no fee to place or lift a security freeze. Unlike a fraud alert, you must separately place a security freeze on your credit file at each credit reporting company. You'll need to supply your name, address, date of birth, Social Security number and other personal information.

After receiving your freeze request, each credit bureau will provide you with a unique PIN (personal identification number) or password. Keep the PIN or password in a safe place. You will need it if you choose to lift the freeze.

How do I lift a freeze? A freeze remains in place until you ask the credit bureau to temporarily lift it or remove it altogether. If the request is made online or by phone, a credit bureau must lift a freeze within one hour. If the request is made by mail, then the bureau must lift the freeze no later than three business days after getting your request.

If you opt for a temporary lift because you are applying for credit or a job, and you can find out which credit bureau the business will contact for your file, you can save some time by lifting the freeze only at that particular credit bureau. Otherwise, you need to make the request with all three credit bureaus.

West Virginia: You have the right to ask that nationwide consumer reporting agencies place "fraud alerts" in your file to let potential creditors and others know that you may be a victim of identity theft, as described above. You also have a right to place a security freeze on your credit report, as described above.

A Summary of Your Rights Under the Fair Credit Reporting Act: The federal Fair Credit Reporting Act (FCRA) promotes the accuracy, fairness, and privacy of information in the files of consumer reporting agencies. There are many types of consumer reporting agencies, including credit bureaus and specialty agencies (such as agencies that sell information about check writing histories, medical records, and rental history records). Your major rights under the FCRA are summarized below. - You must be told if information in your file has been used against you.
- You have the right to know what is in your file.
- You have the right to ask for a credit score.
- You have the right to dispute incomplete or inaccurate information.
- Consumer reporting agencies must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information.
- Consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information.
- Access to your file is limited.
- You must give your consent for reports to be provided to employers.
- You may limit "prescreened" offers of credit and insurance you get based on information in your credit report.
- You have a right to place a "security freeze" on your credit report, which will prohibit a consumer reporting agency from releasing information in your credit report without your express authorization.
- You may seek damages from violators.
- Identity theft victims and active duty military personnel have additional rights.
