We represent Flaherty Salmin LLP ("Flaherty Salmin") located at 2300 Buffalo Road, #200, Rochester, Maine 14624, and are writing to notify your office of an incident that may affect the security of some personal information relating to one (1) Maine resident. The investigation into this matter is ongoing, and this notice will be supplemented with any new significant facts learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Flaherty Salmin does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maine law, the applicability of the Maine data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On February 16, 2021, Flaherty Salmin became aware of suspicious activity related to an employee's computer. Flaherty Salmin immediately took systems offline and launched an investigation to determine the nature and scope of the incident. The investigation confirmed that certain folders and information on the computer may have been accessed by the cybercriminal between February 16 and February 22, 2021. Flaherty Salmin therefore undertook a lengthy and time-intensive, thorough review of the potentially impacted information and its internal files and systems in order to identify the information that was potentially impacted and to whom it related.

On April 9, 2021, Flaherty Salmin first determined that one or more of the folders contained personal information. Flaherty Salmin then worked diligently to continue to review the information and reconcile this information with its internal records in furtherance of identifying the individuals to whom the data relates and the appropriate contact information for those individuals. These efforts were completed on or around April 30, 2021.

Notice to Maine Resident

On or about June 8, 2021, Flaherty Salmin provided written notice of this incident to all affected individuals, which includes one (1) Maine resident. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, Flaherty Salmin moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of Flaherty Salmin systems, and notify potentially affected individuals. Flaherty Salmin is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. Flaherty Salmin is providing access to credit monitoring services for twelve (12) months, through Experian, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, Flaherty Salmin is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including advising individuals to report any suspected incidents of identity theft or fraud to their credit card company and/or bank. Flaherty Salmin is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, information on protecting against tax fraud, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

At Flaherty Salmin LLP ("Flaherty Salmin"), we understand that the confidentiality of your information is very important, and we are committed to protecting it. We are writing to make you aware of an incident that may affect the security of some of your information. This letter provides details of the incident, our response, and resources available to you to help protect your information from possible misuse, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

What Happened? On February 16, 2021, Flaherty Salmin became aware of suspicious activity related to an employee's computer. We immediately launched an investigation to determine the nature and scope of the incident. The investigation confirmed that certain folders and information on the computer may have been accessed by the cybercriminal between February 16 and February 22, 2021 at which time we took the affected systems offline. We therefore undertook a lengthy and time-intensive, thorough review of the potentially impacted information and our internal files and systems in order to identify the information that was potentially impacted and to whom it related. On April 9, 2021, we first determined that one or more of the folders contained personal information. We then worked diligently to continue to review the information and reconcile this information with our internal records in furtherance of identifying the individuals to whom the data relates and the appropriate contact information for those individuals. These efforts were completed on or around April 30, 2021. We thereafter worked to provide notification to potentially impacted individuals as quickly as possible.

What Information was Involved? Our investigation determined that the information related to you that may have been potentially affected includes your name, address, driver's license number, and/or bank account number.

What We Are Doing. Information security is one of Flaherty Salmin's highest priorities, and we have strict security measures in place to protect information in our care. Upon discovering this incident, we immediately took steps to respond, including taking steps to mitigate the event by resetting passwords across the network and bringing in third-party forensic specialists to assist with the investigation and remediation. Further, we notified law enforcement of this event, and have been cooperating with their investigation. We reviewed existing security policies and have implemented additional cybersecurity measures to further protect against similar cybersecurity criminal attacks moving forward. We are notifying the appropriate regulatory authorities and all potentially impacted individuals, including you, so that you may take steps to protect your information.

As an added precaution, we are offering you access to credit monitoring and identity theft protection services for ## months through Experian at no cost to you. You will find information on how to enroll in these services in the enclosed "Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Information." We encourage you to enroll in these services as we are not able to do so on your behalf.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. Please also review the information contained in the enclosed "Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Information."

Monitor Accounts

- 7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.
